

Happy Valley Hosts 180th Alpha Delta Phi Convention

The campus of Penn State University was the setting for the 180th Annual Convention and Leadership Conference of the Alpha Delta Phi from August 8-12, 2012. Hosted by the fraternity's Nittany Chapter, the gathering started unofficially with an epicurean and optional dinner for oenophiles on Wednesday evening at Carnegie House, a retreat and conference center north of State College that was one of the estates maintained by steel baron Andrew Carnegie. About fifteen Alpha Deltas enjoyed a "chef's choice" dinner, accompanied by very generous quantities of fine vintages from several wineries, including legendary pinot noirs from John Dyson's, COR '65, Williams Selyem Winery in the Russian River Valley of Sonoma County. Suffice it to say that Bacchus received considerable homage that evening.

On Thursday morning, August 9, Sandra Stelts, PhD, Curator of Rare Books at Penn State's Paterno Library, gave a private tour for interested Alpha Deltas of the University's collection of manuscripts and materials related to writer John O'Hara (1905-1968), the noted Pennsylvania-born master of the short story who wrote novels of manners of the American upper middle class. O'Hara's lifetime ambition was formed early, when he decided that he wanted to enroll at Yale and become a member of Alpha Delta Phi and Skull and Bones. The untimely death of O'Hara's physician father and the subsequent

crash of the stock market, combined with O'Hara's alcohol-plagued young adulthood and expulsion from several prep schools, precluded Yale. O'Hara in his writings bestowed Alpha Delt membership and Yale attendance on several of the major characters in his novels and novellas, starting in 1934 with *Appointment in Samarra* and continuing through *From the Terrace and Ourselves to Know* three decades later, and these characters were always portrayed in a favorable light.

After the library visit, the Board of Governors held its summer meeting at the Nittany Lion Inn. The meeting addressed routine business matters, the proposed slate of nominees for vacancies on the fraternity's Board of Governors, succession planning and administrative operations of the fraternity office (in relation to the forthcoming retirement of Executive Director Bill Millard, ILL '80.) The highlight

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

of the meeting was a very positive presentation by an interest group from Washington University of St. Louis, petitioning for recognition as an affiliate of the fraternity, with a goal of becoming a new chapter of the fraternity. The Board approved the petition of what is known as the Eliot Affiliate, named after T.S. Eliot, who was a resident for some time at Washington University.

Friday morning was a typical Pennsylvania late summer morning, sunny and humid, and started with an optional tour of Beaver Stadium, starting underneath the field and ending in the skyboxes, offering an insider's view of this legendary arena. The first business session of the Convention followed, featuring the State of the Fraternity address by President Stephen Starnes, HAM '80, which in summary reported that the fraternity overall was doing very well indeed – numbers of initiates are increasing, the number of chapters and affiliates is up to a record 33, participation in the annual Literary Competition sponsored by the Samuel Eells Literary and Educational Foundation is on the upswing, those few chapters with problems or disagreements with their host institutions are all following agreed-upon plans to return to good standing, there have been no claims made against our liability insurance policy and the fraternity is on a stable financial basis. A highlight of the past aca-

demical year was the first-ever Presidents' Executive Summit, held in Baltimore at the Johns Hopkins Chapter. At lunch on Friday, Tom Coakley, PhD, Chairman of the English Department at Mt. Aloysius College and an acclaimed expert on John O'Hara, made a presentation on O'Hara's depiction of fraternities in his writing, on O'Hara's pugnacious and difficult personality, and a perspective on how O'Hara's depiction of sex in his novels – only suggested, never graphically depicted – was considered scandalous because it had the temerity to suggest that women actually enjoyed sex. There was an extensive discussion Friday afternoon among alumni as to the practicality and mechanics of establishing a real estate financing entity to enable fraternity alumni to invest and chapters to borrow funds for the acquisition or renovation of chapter housing. The Convention then ratified the Board's approval of affiliate status for the Eliot Affiliate. Rich Jungman, of Willis, our insurance broker, presented and facilitated a discussion on risk management. Sam Richards, PhD, Professor of Sociology at Penn State, led a very interesting and interactive discussion on free speech versus cultural sensitivity, with considerable discussion and role-playing to address the issue of stereotypes.

Friday evening the delegates and guests ventured outside State College to Tussey Mountain Resort in Boalsburg, PA, for a barbecue-and-bonding session. The event included an unplanned deluge

that had attendees momentarily wading in ankle-deep rain water inside our picnic pavilion, and featured a menu that included grilled local vegetables, mountains of strip steaks and barbecued chicken and copious quantities of two local beverages, Nittany apple cider and Yuengling's lager. One highlight of the evening was the screening of two films based on John O'Hara novels, with Elizabeth Taylor in *Butterfield 8* and Paul Newman in *From the Terrace*.

Saturday morning started with a good old-fashioned Pennsylvania farm breakfast that was sufficient to induce stupor, and then moved into the second day of Convention sessions. Concurrent undergraduate and alumni caucuses focused on recruitment, budgeting and hazing for the undergrads and regional planning, alumni officer leadership and fundraising for the alumni. One activity during the Saturday business session that drew extensive participation was a debate on U.S. immigration policy. "Resolved, that the United States should open its borders to all qualified immigrants." Reports were made to the Convention from the undergraduate and

alumni caucuses; the fraternity's budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2012 – June 30, 2013 was adopted; and the report of the Nominating Committee was presented and accepted by the Convention. [Read the profiles of the new Governors, both undergraduate and alumni, in our next issue.] The ceremonial motion to adjourn the 180th Convention was made (as customary) by the Hamilton delegate, representing our oldest chapter, and seconded by the delegate from Florida State, representing our newest chartered chapter.

On Saturday evening the traditional closing banquet took place, with an acknowledgement of and special thanks to Bro. Don French, MI '53, who was stepping down from the Board of Governors. Don has served on the Board of Governors on three different occasions, has served as president of the fraternity and has on numerous occasions lead task forces and campaigns to aid and assist the Miami Chapter. The dinner also featured the presentation of awards to retiring Executive Director Bill Millard, ILL '80, and to Terrie Eastmade, BDN '97, Assistant Executive Director, for their more than thirty-five years of dedicated service.

Succession for the Executive Office:

At the November 2010 Board of Governors meeting in Seattle, Alpha Delta Phi's long serving Executive Director, Dr. William E. Millard, ILL '80, indicated that he and Assistant Executive Director Terrie Eastmade, BDN '97, were contemplating stepping down "in the near future." President Stephen Starnes, HAM '80, appointed Donald B. French, MI '53, chair of the Succession Planning Committee. Brother French recruited committee members and set to work on the project. At the March 2012 Governors meeting at the Peninsular Chapter, the offer was made and accepted that Bill and Terrie would work with the Board towards a goal of succession completion.

This announcement coincided with the presentation by the Succession Planning Committee of draft job descriptions for each position, as well as a report identifying issues the Board should address before the descriptions were finalized. Numerous issues surround succession in any business; some that were discussed include whether both positions should be filled simultaneously, if shared executive office services exist from other groups, and

that the inclusion of brothers whose job experience would lend assistance in the search process. An immediate issue is the wealth of fraternity heritage housed in our office would need to be moved, archived and stored. In this digital world that could be a monumental but fascinating task. Geographic location is always a consideration as part of the offices function is to manage the Chapter Service Consultants.

Hazing Risk Management:

Wallet-sized cards with the Amnesty Hot Line phone number have been distributed to all chapters and alumni organizations. We have also included a Hot Line card with an explanation of its purpose in every letter to the parents of new members. As explained in the letter, the hot line enables a person to not only report an inappropriate incident after the fact; it also enables someone to act prospectively when in that person's opinion an activity has the potential to be construed as hazing.

Research of hazing suggests that one of the most common threads in incidents is undergraduate effort to conceal questionable activities from their host institution, alumni leaders and national organization. This suggests that more often than not, some or all of the chapter's leadership and membership recognize that the activity has the potential for negative consequences. While some undergraduates may believe the activity should not proceed, the existence of peer pressure and concern of retribution can undercut any protest.


The twofold purpose of the Amnesty Hotline is: first, to provide a mechanism for any member, associate member or parent to notify the Fraternity of questionable activity without fear of retribution. Secondly, the existence of the phone number removes any illusion of a guarantee that a chapter can keep an inappropriate activity completely secret.

A program specifically regarding hazing has been a part of the past two Annual Conventions; the 2011 presentation was given by a former prosecut-

ing attorney and national fraternity executive director; this presentation appeared to hit home with alumni delegates but was less effective with their undergraduate counterparts. This year, the format was far more conversational and challenged delegates to answer a simple question: why would you be mean to someone who you want as a friend? Preventing hazing was also incorporated into the last two Presidents' Summits; this program is designed to empower undergraduate leaders with the confidence to refute members who wish to continue long standing "traditions" during the associate member period which are considered hazing by today's standards. Hazing programs will continue to be part of these events for the foreseeable future.

Education Chair Manual:

As an outgrowth of the above, after the 2011 Convention a small group of governors began to develop a list of suggested appropriate associate member activities. During the subsequent three Board meetings the Governors confronted recurring issues including an inconsistent adherence to the education syllabus. It is evident that chapters need more than a list of suggested activities; they need a written guide that would address administrative, logistical, risk management and education components that a chapter should embrace in regard to how it behaves towards its associate member class. The result was the development of what is hoped to be a comprehensive Education Chair Manual. The manual was distributed at last summer's convention and is available on our website. As this is our first

attempt at such a manual, we welcome any suggestions for improvement.

Expansion:

In November 2011, owing to concerns about our ability to support multiple startup chapters, President Starnes proposed a moratorium that temporarily limited the fraternity's Expansion Program. While the moratorium has slowed the pace of expansion, it has not ground to a halt. In the past year, interest groups at four schools: Rutgers, Washington University in St. Louis, the University of Maryland College Park and the University of Alabama (location of a former chapter which was suspended in 1857 due to pending conflict of civil war) have submitted applications for affiliation. Notwithstanding the moratorium, these applications were so compelling that each was approved by overwhelming majorities by the Board.

These affiliates all are in need of guidance and support from alumni. If you live in the vicinity of one of these institutions and can spare time to provide mentoring and/or guidance, please contact the office.

Website Improvements:

Late last winter the website's developer, Andy Burton, MIN '01, trained Eric Callocchia, JH '10, and me as webmasters. Shortly thereafter, Eric and I reorganized the resource section of the site to make it user friendly for various constituencies; updated a number of areas (e.g., current officers and board members) and Fraternity documents (most notably policies, the Education Chair Manual and candidate biographical forms) have been uploaded to the site. In the future, we hope to again have a members' only site, which will enable our membership to access their chap-

ter's database to locate fellow members, as well as to update their own information. However, before doing so, we need to make sure there is an appropriate site security system in place. As always, we welcome suggestions for improving the site.

Policy Review:

At the November 2011 Board meeting, President Starnes appointed Governors Ed Donahue, JH '68, John Tuttle, COR '81, and Oliver Thorne, BC '13, to a committee charged with reviewing all existing policies and recommending revisions as none of them had been reviewed since their adoption, and the last one was adopted in 1992. The Committee report and a vote to adopt the revised policies will be considered at the May meeting. If you wish to receive a copy of the proposed revisions, please contact the office.

Chapter Service Consultants:

With the number of new chapters being too young to have developed alumni organizations, and a number of established ones with weak or non-existent alumni organizations, our current complement of consultants ("CSCs") is stretched to the limit. Ideally, we would have already expanded to three CSCs; however, funding the position remains an ongoing challenge. Both of our current CSCs will be completing their terms this June; if you are interested in the position or know of someone who would be a good candidate, please contact the office.

Michael [Mike] David Powley: November 22, 1941 – August 22, 2012

Mike Powley, BC '67, died peacefully on Wednesday August 22, 2012 at Peach Arch Hospital after a brief battle with Cancer. Born and raised in Vancouver Mike lived life to the fullest.

He rushed Alpha Delta Phi in 1963 and he won the Alfie award for most outstanding member of his pledge class. He was very active in aquatics and Greek life throughout his time at UBC, serving as Social Chairman of the Fraternity in 1964 and Rush Chairman in 1966. In 1967 he accepted a full time position as the Travelling

Secretary for The Alpha Delta Phi, a post he held until the conflict in Vietnam made his residency in the US untenable.

Brother Powley served on the International Board of Governors and was always very fond of his time spent with fellow Alpha Delta Phi brothers, making lifelong connections, which remained strong until his untimely death. He is survived by his loving wife Rosemarie, daughter Marianne, son David, and three grandchildren, Samuel, Regan, and Alexander.

A message from ΑΔΦ President Bro. Stephen Starnes

Brothers,

What is the collegiate world coming to? In mid November, my alma mater, Hamilton, was deeply touched by a horrific modern problem - heroin. A 19-year-old girl with everything in her favor was found in her dorm room early one morning; she had overdosed on heroin. Fortunately for her and her less than admirable friend, she survived and now must deal with the series of bad decisions, which led her to this tragedy. I will not moralize nor discuss the availability of hard drugs that has recently become more emergent on our college campuses. This is a horrible turn of events that we must address. There is no solace in this other than the fact that this young woman lived. Our Hamilton Chapter appears to be uninvolved but that is not at all the point.

Let us look at some of our recent fraternity activities. You may read in an additional article of the great success we had at the 180th Convention held in State College, PA this August. Please take the time to read of our tremendous intellectually stimulating agenda. It was a meaningfully changing convention.

Penn State and the Nittany Chapter hosted our convention at the Nittany Lion Inn. Over 100 delegates and brothers attended. We held our usual black-tie awards banquet on Saturday evening. Toasts were exchanged and awards for outstanding achievement granted. Just at the peak of our celebratory evening, brothers brought to my attention a serious infraction of our fraternal ethic. . . A brother (and there is no doubt in my mind it was indeed an Alpha Delt) had ripped from the wall the marble dividers between the urinals in the hotel's rest room. The fact that a recently granted award plaque was on the rest room floor further implicates a brother. I wasted the next hour and a half with the Penn State University Police. I learned that the proximity of our banquet to the hotel rooms of our underage undergraduates provided a "pre-party" drinking venue that created an inebriation level that is tremendously discouraging.

I am not a teetotaler. My college friends know full well that I can enjoy a good time. The fact that the drinking age has risen to a level which perverts the college experience is not my choice, nor my preference. If a young person can vote and die for their country it is an absurdity that the age for alcohol consumption is 21. Statistics do not bear out the life saving claims of those who choose to aver this dispersion. Responsible behavior is learned and fraternities like Alpha Delta Phi can teach those good practices. To quote Dean Wormer from fictional Faber, "Fat, drunk and stupid is no way to go through life, son."

These tragic stupidities are sad but they are also opportunities - ones that change the agenda. Our collegiate partners need us to join with them and articulate proper responsible behavior. The President at Cornell has taken a strong stand on hazing - bravo. We need not to work against that effort but to work with it. The President at Trinity suggests that the way forward is through non-single-sex institutions and an immediate induction of members with no "pledge period." I disagree. The pledge period for some may be a time for abuse of underclassmen and a wasted effort to humiliate. Our pledging is not that, but an educational process. We will prohibit, and deal strongly with, any attempt to humiliate a pledge, use or misuse alcohol and put anyone's life at risk. Neither I nor any other member of the Board of Governors will tolerate this kind of misbehavior.

So where does this leave Alpha Delta Phi? Once more we can take the lead, steal the banner of responsibility and prove fraternities hold an integral role in the transition of young men to adulthood. I challenge my undergraduate brothers at Hamilton, Cornell, Trinity and all our chapters to take up the gauntlet of responsibility. Show our support and prevent misbehavior. Help those caught in the fiery net of addiction like the 19-year-old young woman at Hamilton. Work with the college or university administrators to show we can be effective as instruments of change.

As always, please remember Alpha Delta Phi International - we need your support to continue to impact young lives and to carry your fraternity towards its third century. Your chapter needs your monetary support and your participation as mentors. SELEF is a great vehicle to make tax-deductible contributions to scholarship and educational activities. Have a healthy and prosperous new year. "Heaven bless thee, ADPhi."


