During the second half of the 19th Century, Leopold Schmidt sailed from Germany to the United States, made his way across the country and ultimately found himself in Olympia, Washington where, with the help of his eldest son, Peter G. Schmidt, Sr., he opened the Olympia Brewery in 1896. It was in the family's house on the hill above the brewery that Peter G. Schmidt, Jr., WASH '43, was born in 1921. Although Peter worked in the brewery while growing up, he knew his interest was in building boats. And so it was he found himself at the University of Washington in 1939 and there began his association with Alpha Delta Phi Fraternity. As a pledge, during a party at the chapter house, Peter met Elva Mary Ingalls, his wife of 57 years. They had five children and have lived a life that has never been dull.

Fifty years ago, with the goal of designing and building steel-hulled fishing vessels for the fishermen of the Pacific Northwest, Peter opened Marine Construction & Design Co. (MARCO). In 1955, he purchased the patent for the Puretic Power Block from Mario Puretic, a Yugoslav fisherman, and spent the next several years traveling the world with Puretic marketing this invention that effectively mechanized the commercial fishing industry. He was a pioneer in Chile's modern industrial fishery. During the 1960's, the Schmidt family moved to Chile where Peter opened Marco Chilena, a shipyard that is still in operation today and of which Peter's son, Hans, is now general manager. During one two-year period the Marco Chilena shipyard delivered one hundred steel purse seine fishing vessels. Today that shipyard is building large fishing vessels of at least 250 feet in length. At its peak, the shipyard employs over 1,000 workers. In the 1970's, Peter purchased Campbell Industries in San Diego, a tuna vessel shipyard that had been in operation since 1906. At the same time, the Marco shipyard in Seattle was enjoying great success from the King Crab boom, and at the height of the boom, this shipyard was employing 1000 workers and delivering one 120 ft. crab vessel every six weeks.

Through the years, Peter has remained an avid sailor and has twice sailed the TransPac (Los Angeles to Hawaii), often with fellow Alpha Deltas aboard. At 81, he continues to sail his CAL 40, Olympian, competitively — and often wins.

Of his association with Alpha Delta Phi, Peter says:

"Reflecting back to my University years with Alpha Delta Phi, what first comes to mind is the wonderful group of young men who were in the Washington Chapter during my four years in the house. Many of them went on to local and national prominence and were very successful not only in their professional careers but also in their communities. I think Alpha Delta Phi had special meaning for me as I came from a small town to the large university in the big city, growing up with four sisters and a dedication primarily to my own close interests. At the Washington Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi, I found the friends and examples who broadened my character. Nothing could have been better for me at that time in my life. I learned leadership from holding various positions and responsibilities, particularly from the year I spent as rushing chairman - which proved to be a crash course in management and leadership!

The first time I became involved with the house as an alumnus was during the "hippie era" of the late 1960's and early 1970's. My daughters were soon on their way to the University of Washington, and I felt the best way I could understand what was going on with them was to accept the invitation to become President of the Pacific Northwest Alumni of Alpha Delta Phi.

During my eight years on the board of governors I visited every chapter of Alpha Delta Phi and had the opportunity to see the colleges I'd heard about for so many years which turned out to be a very valuable and interesting experience."

Who is Peter Schmidt? He is a dedicated family man, honest businessman, generous contributor to his community, especially the arts, and a proud Alpha Delt.

Reflections As The Presidential Pin Changes Hands

President's Report 2002-2003

This past year has been one of solid, unglamorous, "grind it out" progress for our fraternity. We finished the year with a few more than 250 new brothers initiated. Our new affiliates at Amherst and Penn State are doing extremely well, each ending the past academic year with more than twenty brothers net of graduation. Our Hamilton Chapter achieved tremendous success with a pledge class of twenty-four, twice its normal class. We have initiated twenty-nine brothers at Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Virginia. W&L, founded in 1749, is the eighth oldest university in the United States. The unique circumstance of our W&L group, which has functioned as a fraternity for almost a century, gives us a tremendous opportunity at another outstanding school.

We held several regional leadership conferences during the school year to provide technical assistance to our chapters. Our erstwhile Chapter Services Consultant, Justin Horne, MASS '02, visited all but two of our chapters to provide on-site advice and assistance. Alpha Delta Phi International, our bi-national central organization ended the year with a modest surplus of \$6,000 on revenues of \$185,000. If we stop to think about these numbers, we will see that our total central office (i.e., the International) budget is significantly less than that of some of our individual chapters. We do run the international organization on a shoestring, which accounts for the extremely low level of our fees when compared to other fraternities. On a personal basis, I was very honored by our brothers in Charlottesville, who initiated me as a member of the Virginia Chapter this past spring.

One of the quiet accomplishments of the past year was the first printing of a Chapter Operations Handbook, a compendium of practices and procedures to help our undergraduate chapters operate smoothly. We identified the best practices that we could find for budgeting, recruitment, new member education, alumni relations and more, attempting to institutionalize the knowledge that often went out the door when the officers of a chapter graduated. A companion handbook for alumni organizations is in progress, as is an Initiation Manual drawn on the prior work of our Cornell Brothers. One of the most difficult challenges facing every organization today is the costs of both liability and property

insurance. While each chapter that owns real estate procures its own property insurance, the International offers liability insurance to protect us from the vagaries of trial lawyers and lawsuits. We have had several lurid examples of costly incidents that have impacted the costs of our liability insurance; the annual cost per undergraduate brother of this very necessary insurance is \$195, and we must make every effort to contain these costs.

The major focus of 2003-2004 activities by the Board of Governors will be the final planning and preliminary events of the capital campaign announced at last year's Convention. We are committed to raise \$10.0 million via tax deductible contributions, with the income (net of inflation) from this amount used for more Seward Scholarships, laptops or similar technology for new members, and housing subsidies tied to grade point averages. The entire campaign will extend over several years.

Finally, the 25th anniversary of the movie "Animal House," based on our Dartmouth Chapter, is fast upon us. I have been interviewed by *Newsweek* for an extended article they plan on this subject; Mike Growney, D '58, one of the role models for the movie, has also been interviewed by the same publication. Universal Studios aired a documentary on the making of the film, including an interview of Chris Miller, D '63, who wrote the screenplay. Chris is reportedly involved in planning a sequel or follow-up to the movie. The board is monitoring these activities to protect our interests. As an aside, what was seen as a scandalous outrage twenty-five years ago now looks to be pretty harmless, and we should use it to our advantage.

Our goal is to provide a life-long experience for our members that is based on friendship and mutual support, to help each of us improve morally, socially and intellectually. We must resolve to have "many hands but one heart" to accomplish the work yet undone. To paraphrase Robert Frost, who once taught a poetry course in our old chapter house at Amherst College, we have "promises to keep, and miles to go before we sleep."

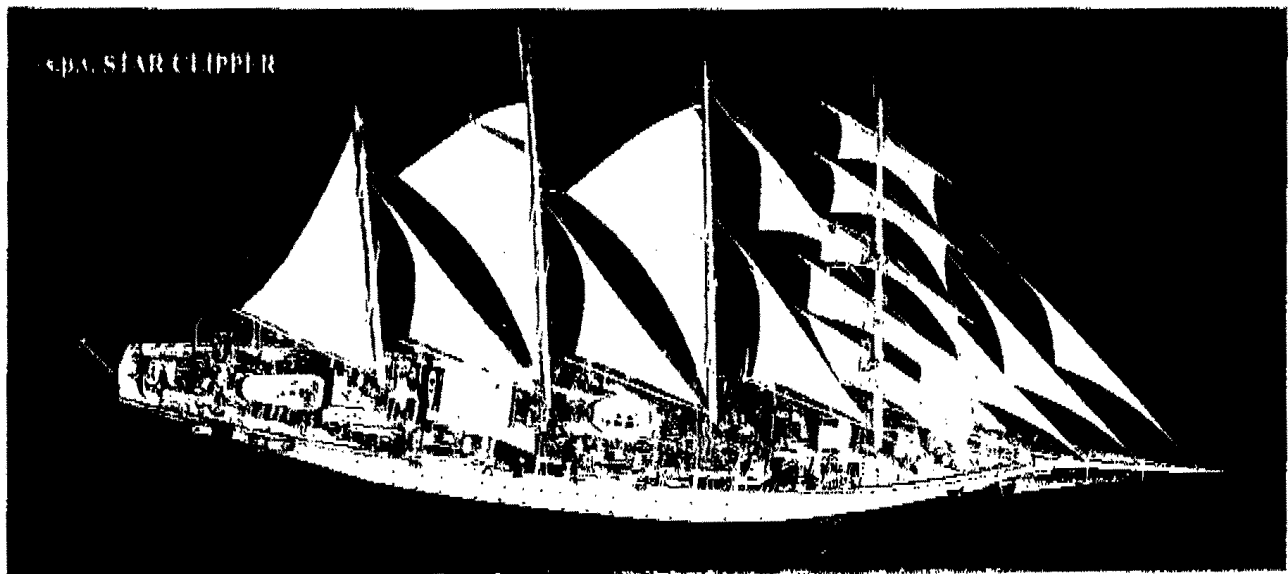
ADP LEGACIES

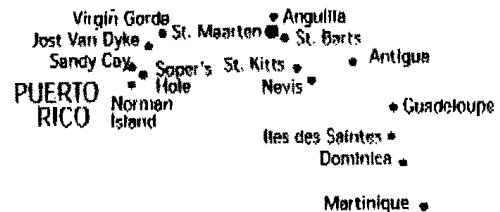

Early in August of this year, brothers from all over the United States and Canada traveled many miles to Minneapolis, Minnesota, to participate in this year's 171st International Convention. It seemed appropriate to hold the convention in Minneapolis, as we all celebrated the triumphant return of the Minnesota Chapter with the formal re-issuance of their charter. Due to their dedication, hard work, and sacrifice to make Minnesota a chapter once more, Doug Watson, MINN '68, and Brian Bergson, MINN '89, presided as honorary co-chairmen of the ceremonies.

The overall theme of this year's convention was recruitment. This important theme, instrumental to the growth of our fraternity, was presented thoroughly throughout the convention. The general session on Friday morning was followed by a formal lunch, at which Brother Kenneth Ferguson, MINN '63, related his amazing story of survival and brotherhood that touched all who were in attendance.

Another important topic discussed was that of risk management and liability. Richard Jungman, our insurance broker from the Kirkland Insurance/Hobbs Group, talked extensively Friday afternoon, explaining that the number of

claims against fraternities continues to rise. As a consequence of this, the fraternity's insurance costs are rising as well; therefore, it is imperative that brothers do all they can to manage risky situations and conduct themselves in a safe manner.

On Saturday morning, more business items were discussed, including: the election of governors, a report from the Samuel Eells Literary and Educational Foundation, the new merchandising program headed by Terrie Eastmade, and the plans for the 2004 convention (which will be held in California, at the Adelphi Chapter). Following this business session was lunch and a subsequent pickup softball game attended by many of the brothers. While many of the brothers didn't have gloves or shoes, everyone had a great time.

The culmination of events was a memorial service for fallen brothers held at the Minnesota Chapter house. At the conclusion of this memorable service, the brothers paraded, led by a bagpiper and color guard, to the newly renovated

University of Minnesota Student Union for the fraternity's annual banquet. At the banquet, many awards were given to outstanding brothers in honor of their dedication to the fraternity. The brothers in attendance witnessed Ed Donahue, JH '68, stepping down from his presidential duties and the subsequent installation of David Brewster, VIR '94, as our fraternity's new president. The banquet concluded with applause as the proud Minnesota Chapter was re-issued their charter, the culmination of years of hard work and teamwork by the brothers of the chapter. The brothers of the Minnesota Chapter thank everyone for their help in the rebirth of their chapter in the North Star State and making this an unforgettable convention.

ADP Expands to Washington and Lee

The Washington and Lee Chapter of another fraternity has severed its ties to its national organization after almost one hundred years of successful operation at the eighth oldest university in the nation. A group of thirty former members of the Virginia Epsilon Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon has petitioned the Board of Governors to become the Robert E. Lee Affiliate of the Alpha Delta Phi. This unexpected turn of events took place in mid-July, when the thirty-seven members of Sigma Phi Ep's ninth-oldest chapter (together with three other chapters of the same fraternity) reached an impasse with the SPE national organization. The chapter was in good standing with the university, had a high GPA, was well-regarded in the university community, had a stable financial record and had no history of disciplinary problems or insurance claims. The Dean of Students at W&L, in a meeting with Alpha Delt's former president Ed Donahue, said that she regretted the situation, stating that she personally knew most of the members of the chapter and considered them to be good students and solid members of the community.

Alpha Delta Phi's Expansion Committee has long had this institution on its radar screen, but has always concluded that the costs (in both dollars and volunteer effort) of expanding to this campus was prohibitive. Washington and Lee, founded in 1749, is an elite liberal arts

school located in Lexington, Virginia in the Shenandoah Valley, with an undergraduate student body of about 1,700; the university also has a well-regarded law school. Eighty percent of the undergraduate student body belongs to fraternities or sororities, ranking W&L as the college or university with the highest Greek participation rate in the United States.

The initial contact with Alpha Delta Phi came through Eric Osborne, AM '04, who attended high school in Memphis with one of the former officers of the W&L Chapter. A series of phone conversations and informal visits were followed by "due diligence" inquiries by Alpha Delta Phi. Two members of the Virginia Epsilon Chapter attended Alpha Delt's 171st Convention in Minneapolis as guests of the Board of Governors. Both (former president) Ed Donahue and (current president) David Brewster have made several trips to Lexington, which is located about 70 miles west of our existing chapter at the University of Virginia. The Board of Governors is devising a plan and program to quickly integrate this group of outstanding young men into Alpha Delta Phi. The chapter is currently seeking recognition by the university and its IFC. On October 4 in Lexington, with Alpha Delt alumni from Rochester, Virginia and Hopkins participating, twenty-nine young men were initiated as brothers of the Robert E. Lee Division of the Virginia Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi.

Foundation Name Change

The Alpha Delta Phi Foundation has changed its name to the Samuel Eells Literary and Educational Foundation. President Robert S. Price, K '58 explained the reasons for the change. "The prior name of our Foundation did not explain either our mission or the basis of our tax-exemption. Our mission is to support the historic, literary and educational purposes of Alpha Delta Phi, a mission that is obviously both worthy of support and tax exempt in nature. In furtherance of that mission, the Foundation has long conducted our annual literary competition and administered and awarded our Seward Scholarships. We have also undertaken literary and educational projects at any chapter that has asked for our help. In deciding what to call our Foundation, it was equally obvious that our founder's name should be honored."

Meet Dustin Jones, Our New CSC

Alpha Delta Phi International would like to congratulate Dustin Jones, CAL '03, for being selected as the 2003-2004 Chapter Service Consultant. Dustin recently graduated from the University of California, Berkeley with a Bachelor of Arts in Economics and Legal Studies. Dustin plans to attend law school after working for the fraternity.



Bro. Jones was initiated into the California Chapter in the fall of his freshman year, and became president the follow-

ing semester. The chapter had hit upon hard times and it fell upon a group of freshmen and sophomores to put things back on track. Dustin worked with the brothers to stabilize the chapter, financially, and increase focus on recruitment. After his term as president, Dustin spent a year as treasurer and alumni relations chair. Thanks to his, and many other brothers' efforts, the California Chapter is now much more successful and quickly increasing its numbers. During his travels, Dustin plans to help undergraduates create and maintain viable financial plans as well as improving member recruiting and alumni relations.

Sharing The Oldest Fraternity Structure

On October 11, 2003, the Kenyon Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi, and its alumni organization, The East Wing Association, dedicated Ganter Hall and turned it over to Kenyon College. Ganter Hall is named after Brother Carl R. Ganter, Class of 1899, who was President of Alpha Delta Phi in 1939. Brother Ganter was the son of Richard Ganter, 1856, one of the founders of the Kenyon Chapter. The 3,200 square foot stone building, costing more than \$400,000, was built with contributions to Kenyon from alumni of the Kenyon Chapter and stands next to the Kenyon Lodge on land leased to the college by the fraternity. Ganter Hall reproduces the shape of Old Kenyon, the East Wing of which has been the home of the chapter since 1865. One third of the Ganter contains a reproduction of the "Bulls-eye Room", which was the elegant social "parlor" in the East Wing of Old Kenyon until its destruction by fire on February 27, 1949. That room will be shared by the fraternity with the rest of the college. The remainder of the Ganter is principally for

use by the chapter and will provide it with social rooms not available in the Kenyon Lodge. The Lodge, built in 1860 and now the oldest fraternity structure in America, was thoroughly renovated for the dedication, receiving extensive repairs to its slate roof, interior painting and new emerald green and white (with black and gold subsidiary colors) Victorian wallpaper.

Eugene V. Rostow, Y '33 Passes at 89

Bro. Eugene Rostow, a famous, and often controversial, national figure died on November 25th, of last year, of congestive heart failure. Bro. Rostow, a towering figure in U.S. policy from WWII through the Reagan Administration, was also Dean of the Yale Law School from 1955 to 1965 and was credited with re-vamping the curriculum and elevating the school's reputation.



Bro. Rostow was one of the first people to speak out strongly against the Supreme Court's approval of internment camps for Japanese Americans. "It was a *War Review* article of which he remained proud all his life," his son, Victor, said.

Many became familiar with Bro. Rostow through his strong defense of the administration's Vietnam Policy while Undersecretary of State for President Lyndon Johnson in the late 1960's, a point of view his son describes as, "not so much based on morality as on law and our obligations under treaty, and our obligations as a great power to the people of Vietnam."

Named after the Socialist politician, Eugene V. Debs, Bro. Rostow also served as head of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency during the early part of the Reagan Administration. Bro.
